"Afterwards, I sailed off with him. We were together for about six years. I sailed across the Atlantic twice, and from South Africa to South America. We lived on the boat for most of the time. It was a real adventure."

Returning home, she started work as a travel documentary photographer. "I travelled to countries

She turned to art photo-

graphy, and then became a prize-winning sculptor. "I've been an artist for 15

vears," she says.

Gwen made a canoe and paddled the Irish waterways in 2019 to 2020. "During the journey, I researched people along the way. I thought there was a story that needed to be told. I felt it unfolding."
